Welcome to the BC Rural Network

It was in 2003 that work began on establishing the *BC Rural Network*, in order to enhance the capacity of British Columbia to develop responses to rural and remote community issues. The need and desire to improve networking and exchange of information among rural communities has been clearly identified and requested by rural stakeholders across BC. At the "Sharing Lessons Learned" forum in Prince George in May 2003, the importance of improving communications across rural BC was again recognized as key to building stronger rural communities in our province. While there are many existing networks and resources available to rural communities, no broad information is inclusive of all concerns of rural communities (i.e. social, economic and environmental). It was recommended that a few people take action in order to determine next steps.

After that event, an initial *Working Group* of five representatives of rural organizations met several times to discuss how to build better communication to meet rural needs, and to coordinate and strengthen efforts to build the capacity of rural communities in BC. In March 2005, the Working Group held the *BC Rural Network Planning Forum* to open the discussion to a broader audience for further input and development. The Working Group took direction from the participants to determine key priorities and focus for the BC Rural Network.

It is now the goal of the BC Rural Network to continue the dialogue with rural communities and organizations across BC through a series of regional forums, as well as through the development of a website, listserv, and this newsletter!

The BCRN newsletter will be published twice a year, in the spring and the fall. In this first issue of the BCRN newsletter, you will find information about the upcoming activities of the BCRN, a profile of several rural organizations and initiatives, and an opportunity to provide your comments and suggestions.

The “**Strengthening Links Between Rural Communities**” Conference will be an opportunity for rural residents and representatives of rural organizations from across the province to come together and discuss ways to coordinate their efforts to improve networking and build the capacity of rural communities in BC. The first AGM of the BC Rural Network will also be held in conjunction with the conference.

Community Futures Development Corp. of Okanagan Similkameen, the BC Rural Network, and the BC Rural Team are joining forces to organize the conference.

Workshops will share a range of resources, and planning and skill - building tools that have been developed and utilized in other rural communities across BC. Presentations from government and service delivery agencies will provide information on current and up-coming programs and initiatives of interest to rural communities. “Sharing

Lessons Learned” sessions will highlight experiences from rural communities on how to strengthen links between geographical communities, multiple community populations, and communities of interest.

LIGHTS, CAMERA, YOUTH ACTION: Red Carpet Youth Film Festival

The **Red Carpet Youth Film Festival** is held annually in Vernon, BC. Now in its fifth year, it has grown to include youth from across the Southern Interior (Thompson, Kootenays and Okanagan regions), with a whopping forty-four entries last year.

Initially organized by *Connections Career Centre* in Vernon (a youth employment centre funded by the Government of Canada), the Festival is now primarily coordinated by youth volunteers in the community, led by the North Okanagan Youth Source Youth Arts Council (NOYS) with the help of its new parent organization, the *Vernon Community Arts Council*.

The two-day event has industry professionals delivering workshops on film production, acting for the screen, editing techniques, special effects and more. In addition, there is a film and television tradeshow that gives rural youth access to information about film schools, networks and resources to make a career in this field more accessible. Youth can receive film scholarships, prizes, and public recognition for their work.

This initiative teaches youth about the impact

they can have by working together in the arts. The Red Carpet Youth Film Festival is a forum that tells stories of life, as perceived through the eyes of youth. Making a movie can be really challenging and involves patience, organization, and an overall vision. It's like giving youth the right tools to be creative, to step into the shoes of a Director, and show us what they can accomplish if given the chance.

The NOYS is currently seeking funding to expand the Red Carpet Youth Film Festival up to Northern BC through other youth councils, high schools, and arts councils. For more information, contact:
