Kamloops Air Quality Roundtable

Draft Meeting Summary as at May 3, 2019

1. Welcome, Introductions, Review Agenda and Objectives

Mike Simpson welcomed everyone, Secwepemc territory was acknowledged, and introductions were made around the room. The agenda was approved as presented. Regrets were noted from many, including those sick today who intended on attending the tour.

Note that quorum was not met without First Nations present, but that Mike got Raynell's approval of the previous meeting summary in advance of the meeting.

Mike noted that Nicole MacCulloch has finished her position with KGHM Ajax Mine, James Loughton is the new representative on KAQR.

2. Previous Meeting Summaries

Meeting summary from February 28, 2019 was approved (see note above about quorum).

Old action items from the previous meeting summary were reviewed. Many are on today's agenda; those complete have been removed; those not complete will be carried forward (see end of this summary):

- Domtar's wood ash is useful for biosolids, soil amendments, and odour control
- Mike will get a one-pager about the Kamloops Air Quality Roundtable to Glen or Jaimi
- Melissa spoke to two principals about being involved in education initiatives
- Education subcommittee to meet before end of June
- TRU's biomass burner plans are still being explored
- Emily contacted Jamie Vieira of TNRD, he is busy and not committed to joining KAQR, but is interested in the woodstove exchange program

3. New Gold - New Afton Mine

Daniel, Andrew, Korah and Luke gave an overview of New Gold as a company, and the operation of the New Afton mine. Mining predominantly copper with some gold and silver, the original Afton mine was operated by Teck from 1978 to 1987, with New Gold beginning production in 2012. Mining is underground using block-cave techniques, and it is the largest underground hard rock mine in Canada based on throughput. Agreements have been in place with Stk'emlupsemc te Secwepemc Nation (SSN) since 2008, and currently 23% of the workforce is Indigenous. Carbon emissions are tracked, only 14% of their energy use is from diesel fuel, 79% is electricity which has limited emissions due to its hydropower source. Idling reduction measures have been put in place, but monitoring and measuring outcomes is

challenging. Fugitive dust from exposed tailings and other sources are actively monitored and managed. Partisol monitors for PM_{2.5} are installed around the mine property, and vegetation monitoring and monitoring of heavy metals is ongoing. Revegetation of exposed areas also addresses particulate matter. New Gold works closely with numerous professors and students at Thompson Rivers University, including the NSERC Industrial Research Chair in Ecosystem Restoration Dr. Lauchlan Fraser. New Gold also has



numerous initiatives underway to monitor health of employees.

After the meeting adjourned, KAQR members undertook a surface and mill tour.

4. Information Sharing

Thompson Rivers University - Aaron noted the continuing initiatives to encourage transportation other than cars to, from and on campus, including incentives and discounts on electric bikes. A bike share program that is being explored. Aaron is also starting a master's degree program looking at environmental impacts of electric bikes.

City of Kamloops - Emily noted that Josie is off on maternity leave, Glen will likely be filling that position soon. The woodstove exchange program is progressing, and the City is also offering a pilot to enable residents to scrap their old woodstoves without cost and without replacing it. The City is moving forward with forest fuel management projects to reduce the wildfire hazard risk in key locations such as Barnhartvale, Juniper, Pineview and Kenna Cartwright Park.

Domtar - Kristin noted that Earth Week is coming up at Domtar, promotion of air quality initiatives and demonstrations of electric bikes will be part of the program.

First Nations Health Authority - Fiona noted that they are preparing for wildfire season by working with communities on their clean air shelter plans.

Association of BC Forest Professionals Annual General Meeting - Mike relayed something learned at the recent AGM in February: that controlled ecosystem burns, prescribed burns and burning of cured material from forest fuel reduction projects has significantly less PM_{2.5} content than wildfires. The analogy provided was compared to burning dry kindling compared

to wet wood; controlled or prescribed burns are under good venting conditions burns much cleaner than wildfires that burn live, green trees of all sizes and higher moisture content.

5. Financial Contributions

Mike reported that Fraser Basin Council labour and expenses for the year ending March 31, 2019 were \$6000. The \$2000 committed from Thompson Rivers University will be carried forward to the current fiscal year. An additional \$4000 is needed to maintain current levels of activity; potential commitments were noted from City of Kamloops, New Gold and Domtar.
