

## **Reports from Program Managers**

Erin Vieira provided a report summarizing the year, April 1<sup>st</sup> 2024 – March 31<sup>st</sup> 2025:

- The Water Quality Grant Program awarded six grants to five Shuswap-area farms in 2024 worth \$55,203 which leveraged an additional \$60,984 for a total investment of \$116,187 in water quality protection and improvement
- Development of the Shuswap Wetland Strategy progressed, with the completion of a third phase involving field work and wetland assessments
- 97 water samples were collected from 12 sites on six water bodies in the Shuswap watershed and tested for the presence of invasive Zebra and Quagga mussels – all test results were positive, meaning that ZQM were not found in any samples
- The SWC's educational campaigns about aquatic invasive species had • approximately 4.4 million impressions on residents and travellers
- Funding from the SWC assisted two graduate students in their watershed research, located in the Shuswap
- The SWC received a \$153,765 grant from the Canada Water Agency in 2024-25 for priority projects and administration costs
- Total expenses for the year were \$384,667

Erin Vieira and Alex de Chantal also provided an update on program operations since the last SWC meeting:

- The Water Quality Grant Program for 2025 is operational, a total of \$34,656 grant funding is being awarded to four Shuswap-area farms and one non-profit stewardship organization for water quality protection and improvement
- Educational campaigns for the prevention of aquatic invasive species are underway for the spring and summer months, watercraft users are reminded to practice 'Clean-Drain-Dry' and stop for watercraft inspection
- Staff have submitted a new grant application to the Canada Water Agency to support 2025-26 programs.

## Budget for 2025-26 passed

Staff presented an updated budget and work plan for 2025-26, and SWC members had a roundtable discussion. Priority items include the Water Quality Grant Program; aquatic invasive species prevention; communications, outreach and advocacy; support for administration and Council meetings; and fund development.
